One Hundred Names for Love

We hope you were one of the 150 people who joined together on the afternoon of April 1st, in celebration of the Aphasia Center's 15 years of transforming lives! The special event, *One Hundred Names For Love*, was held at the Downtown Oakland Senior Center, and featured an afternoon of creative expression, including singing by *The Dreamers*, and a dance performance by the *Ross Dance Company*.

President & Founder, Dr.
Roberta Elman, provided a personal retrospective of the reasons why she started the ACC, the first independent Aphasia Center in the United States. She shared that she is most proud that the Center has provided more than 64,900 group treatment visits over the years, while also providing \$141,000 in financial assistance to members who live at or below the federal poverty level.

Celebrating 15 years of transforming lives.... As I was getting ready to attend the Aphasia Center of California's special anniversary event on April 1, 2012, my heart was beating, as I, too, was celebrating 15 years since my own stroke. Dr. Roberta Elman, President & Founder of the ACC had told me that the Aphasia Center of California had started on September 1, 1996. My stroke had occurred on September 30, 1996. Such an important and meaningful coincidence!

The ACC's 15-year celebration was full of happy memories that brought tears to my eyes. Remembering our "communication" classes made me smile as the years have flown by. The ACC speech-language pathologists, Roberta Elman, Ellen Bernstein-Ellis, and Sue Ewing, were all amazing. They cared so much for us and we all worked so hard.

At the Sunday celebration, it was terrific to see the people I had known and worked with over the years. We had participated in so many wonderful programs together: conversation treatment groups, aphasia book club groups, exercise classes, as well as so many fun occasions, from the Annual "Walk to Talk" to the many holiday and other special events.

The keynote speaker was Diane Ackerman, the acclaimed author of non-fiction and poetry. Her presentation touched me as she told the story of her life. Diane's husband of 34 years, Paul West, survived a devastating stroke. He had authored 50 books, but was left saying only "mem."

As I listened to their story, I

thought of how my stroke had affected my husband. We had been married just five months, when I had a stroke that left me with aphasia. As Diane's husband had surpassed doctors' expectations, my recovery has also surprised many people. My husband's care and love for me was so similar to the care that Diane had given her husband. She wrote of her experience with her husband "as an inspiring testament to the plasticity of the brain and the power of love."

Over the last 15 years, the Aphasia Center of California has been a wonderful organization, improving the lives of so many people, in so many ways. As a stroke survivor, I am honored to have the Aphasia Center of California in my life.

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
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
