I first met Elaine Ivankovich in 1994. Her husband, Lou, was a stroke survivor with aphasia. Lou enrolled in our initial research study to investigate the efficacy of aphasia group treatment. Lou was a wonderful man and a fantastic communicator. Even though he only produced a few words of spoken language, he developed an amazing ability to communicate through a combination of gesture, pantomime, and drawing.

To this day, I teach speech-language pathologists about the various techniques that people with severe aphasia can use to be successful com-

municators, by telling them about Lou Ivankovich.

After our research project was completed, Lou and Elaine stayed connected to the Aphasia Center. Lou volunteered at the ACC and helped others with aphasia to learn to use drawing to communicate. Elaine helped out at various ACC events. Then, in 2001, Lou's health began failing, and in 2002, he passed away from esophageal cancer.

After Lou's passing, one of

ACC Participates in the AphasiaBank **Research Project**

The ACC was invited to participate in a research project being conducted by Carnegie Mellon University. In July, we were privileged to host internationally known speech-language pathologists, Dr. Audrey Holland and Margie Forbes. Audrey and Margie traveled to Oakland to assess ACC volunteers on a variety of language tests. Fifteen ACC members participated in the AphasiaBank research project. The results of the testing will be entered

into a computerized data bank that will be accessible to aphasia researchers. The goal of the project is to collect language information for a wide variety of people with aphasia. Researchers plan to use the testing information to learn more about the language problems that occur in aphasia as well as more effective ways to treat these difficulties.

The Aphasia Center of California has teamed up with Donate For Charity,


